Donovan's *vision*

Upon reflecting on my first two months, it has been an inspirational learning journey thus far, as I navigate through the SAEP landscape, getting to know staff, programmes and all stakeholders. We are at an exciting stage in the history of the organisation, with the departure of the previous director, Jane Keen handing over the mantle (after 18 years) to me, to lead the organisation into a new era.

This is indeed a difficult period for all globally as we are still in the grip and lockdown of a devastating pandemic and patiently waiting on vaccinations to reach everyone locally. **The impact of the pandemic has challenged everyone to think differently and innovatively about their work and particularly their implementation strategies.** It has been especially challenging for NGO's working in the education sector, but I am extremely proud to be associated with SAEP who have shown their adaptability and flexibility in terms of responding to the socio-economic issues within the community of Philippi and immediate surrounds that we support. **Through the Thuso relief fund we managed to support our ECD centres, schools and post matric programme participants in various ways**, be it through food security, PPEs, and other required resource support.

We are currently in the process of working towards finalising our 3-year strategic plan and exploring exciting opportunities to expand and grow the programmes, albeit in this difficult period.

Together with the board we have decided to have a more **community based and community responsive approach**. This approach would mean returning to our roots as SAEP and focusing on working in Philippi for all or most of our programmes and looking to grow our reach within Philippi and immediate surrounds:



- ✓ Increasing the number of beneficiaries
- ✓ Working with families more broadly
- ✓ Increasing the number of institutions (primary and high schools)
- ✓ Engaging more with government departments to ensure access to services
- ✓ Engaging with other organisations, forums, political structures working in the area
- ✓ Providing a more holistic experience.

As part of going back to our roots, we are using a garden analogy to best describe our work and aptly referring to and introducing relevant concepts such as organic, growth, nurture, indigenous and sustainability into our thinking processes. Thus, **revisiting, linking and incorporating environmental issues and aspects into our current work and going forward.** We are thus hoping that we can, together with all our partners, beneficiaries and communities grow this indigenous garden into a beautiful space of sustainability and resilience to collectively withstand the challenges that we face in this period. **So let's not fear change, but rather embrace it...**

Early Childhood Development (ECD):

Safety in the time of COVID-19:

There have been many challenges and for ECD centres to reopen safely is a triumph. SAEP has supported centres with material resources, information and mentoring, providing focused, appropriate measures to sustain safe, healthy and nurturing spaces for young children in Philippi.



Financial viability

SAEP staff supported ECD principals to apply for grants available from the Presidential Stimulus Package, helping with internet access, processing documents and explaining the requirements. To date **93 centres have registered** for the scheme with our help. SAEP is now tasked with verifying the centres, an arduous and time-consuming task.



Food

For many children, daily nutritious meals at their ECD centres are essential for health and development. Generous donors enabled SAEP to provide food for centres to feed the children as they reopen after the long downtime.



PPE and sanitizing supplies

All the centres in our programme – **149 in total, have received PPE**, some more than once as their operations show the need. Donations in kind came from many sources, and we are grateful to them all: **Department of Economic Development and Tourism (DEDAT)** provided sanitizing packs which included water containers – absolutely essential for those in informal settlements. **Department of Social Development (DSD)** provided PPE through us and **Masks for Medics** provided masks, sanitizing supplies and dispensers. This is vital to protect the children, ECD centre staff and the community in which they live.

Supported by Prudential Investment Managers CSI, we have completed the first phase of the rebuild and will start the second shortly, hoping to finish before the winter rains, creating a high quality, safe space for children to grow.



Post-Matric Programme

After the disruption of 2020, lockdown and virtual learning, many students and young people are seriously disadvantaged. **The Bridging Year Programme (BY)** is committed to **helping students catch up the skills and knowledge lost and focus on their future studies and careers.** Starting late this year because of the late release of matric results and late start of the academic year in tertiary institutions, recruitment is almost complete, orientation started on 19 March and classes began immediately afterwards.



For this year, we received more than 100 applications for BY of whom 50 were accepted and included in the orientation process. There are 20 on a waiting list.

Our students will have the best possible chance of improving their academic standing and choosing the best possible courses for their interests and abilities in future. Lessons from 2020 have been applied in the course design for 2021 – **we will run online classes parallel with classes in person; to develop the skill of online learning** which will be essential for all students in the foreseeable future and to allow seamless transition to virtual learning if the regulations change to restrict contact classes. More than ever, young people need hope and encouragement to **develop themselves and make progress in the world.** BY walks beside them in the early stage of this journey.

If I may say so myself, the success rate is very impressive this year (2020), given the difficult year we had and other challenges that came with that... Our hard work has paid off, and it is a team effort.

The Tertiary Support Programme is celebrating 10 graduates from 2020 and still confirming results of others.

We have confirmed that 25 BY students from 2020 are registered and studying at tertiary level.

There are 53 students registered for TSP, registration continues and orientation will take place in April, when advisers will be teamed with students.

We expect 80 students for 2021.
